FOREWORD

(To the Teachers' Resource Books – in different languages)

This Teacher's Resource Book is designed for Primary Three teachers to conduct lessons in the local language of instruction. It demystifies technical terms relating to lesson preparation and delivery such as assessment in learning competencies. It also presents translations of the concepts specified in the curriculum to experiences relevant to the learner in Primary Three.

The teachers should note that the Resource Book picks up the learning actions identified in the Primary Three Thematic Curriculum and the Teacher's Guide, and converts them into simple teacher and class drills done using the local language as the verbal medium of communication. The teacher is expected to take advantage of the learner's use of the local language to encourage learners' full participation in all the learning activities. The learners should be given the opportunity to site other examples in addition to those captured in the Resource Book in order to enrich the examples given. In the same way, teachers could develop supplementary resources to this book using the learners' contributions.

The Teacher's Resource Book provides a variety of challenges that make learning an engaging and enjoyable experience for children. The activities included are riddles, songs, drama, games, proverbs and stories which the teacher is required to use creatively to keep the class lively and make learning enjoyable to the learners.

This is therefore to recommend this Teacher's Resource Book in the local language for use in all primary schools where applicable.

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PART A

INTRODUCTION TO THE TEACHER'S RESOURCE BOOK (TRB)

What is a Teacher's Resource Book?

It is a teacher's bank of suitable and relevant items that can facilitate the teaching/ learning process.

Rationale

This Teacher's Resource Book provides the teacher with a variety of items such as, songs, rhymes, games, stories, tongue twisters, lullabies, situational games, riddles, proverbs and poems. These help the teacher consolidate the vocabulary and structures learnt under a particular theme.

These items are designed to make the lessons more interesting and participatory.

The items given are just a sample to help teachers create similar ideas depending on the environment and the situation where they are. This will make the teaching/learning process more meaningful.

Objectives

- 1. To revitalise the use of songs, rhymes, charts, games, tongue twisters, stories, situational games, proverbs, poems and riddles.
- 2. To promote and preserve Uganda's different culture.
- 3. To help the teacher enrich his/her method of teaching so as to make the teaching/learning process more interesting and meaningful.

HOW TO USE THE TRB

- 1. This resource should be used in consultation with the Curriculum and the Teacher's Guide to the curriculum.
- 2. In the Teacher's Guide under the lesson plan guidelines, these items are made mention of. The teacher is expected to use the given items during the days where they appear.
- 3. The teacher is expected to go through the items before the lesson.
- 4. The teacher is expected to write the item on the board for the class. The item written should be read aloud by the teacher, the whole class, in groups and finally by the individual learners.

 NB:
 - It should be noted that the teacher is free to use his/her own collection too.
 - The learners are also a resource and the teacher may encourage them to write their own items which may be used in the classroom.
 - The items are not meant to overshadow the lesson but rather to facilitate what has been learnt.
 - The teacher should ensure that all the learners participate during learning.

ITEMS IN THE TRB

Organization of items in this TRB is according to themes. These items are categorized as presented below:

SONGS

Items in this section are to promote listening skills, appreciation, creativity, enjoyment and active participation of learners in the instructional process.

The provided songs are selected according to different types namely;

- (i) work songs
- (ii) ceremonial songs
- (iii) war songs
- (iv) songs about creatures
- (v) praise and worship songs
- (vi) lullabies

STORIES

Stories are intended to develop a number of skills, the major ones being listening, speaking, imagination, creativity and appreciation. Stories in this TRB have been selected using the vocabulary and structures in a given sub-theme. Legends, myths, folk tales and parables may be used when teaching. As a teacher, you are encouraged to compose stories which can help you to teach different learning areas as you design different concepts and competencies.

GAMES

Games in this TRB are intended to support the teacher's methodology and facilitate the teaching/learning process. Besides the development of concepts and competencies, games are enjoyable and motivating to both the teacher and learners.

The teacher should formulate and use a particular game depending on the selected content and situation in which he/she is teaching the children.

RHYMES

Rhymes are intended to facilitate easy grasping of concepts, enjoyment, confidence building and development of speech organ, intonation, articulation, stress and consolidation of learnt language.

TONGUE-TWISTERS

Tongue twisters are characterized by repetition of certain sounds and words or phrases with emphasis on pronunciation, stress, intonation, speed and speech. They are also intended to help the learners identify the difference between similar and confusing letter sounds.

The tongue twisters selected are simple enough and short to suit the level and ability of the child. For a start they should be said slowly, several times but with time, the speed at which the tongue twister is said should be increased. Tongue twisters help develop speech skills and help in speech therapy.

PROVERBS

Proverbs are wise sayings with hidden meanings that promote critical thinking, interpretation, cultural norms and values. They are intended to stimulate the children's thinking, creativity and act as guiding principles in different life situations. As a teacher you are encouraged to make adequate research from the locality within which the school is so as to compile proverbs that are appropriate for the class.

RIDDLES

A riddle is a question that is difficult to understand and it always has a surprising answer. In this TRB riddles are intended to stimulate imagination, creativity, critical thinking and logical reasoning among the learners. Some riddles have been provided in this TRB. However, as a teacher you are encouraged to formulate more relevant and meaningful riddles together with your learners.





Long ago, people from Bukinda Sub-county were hard working. Men used to go hunting animals from forests. Women used to grow crops like millet, sorghum, Irish potatoes, onions on the top of hills.

Young boys went to catch fish from Lake Bunyonyo and sell the fish to earn a living. Every Saturday young children would collect fire wood from forests. They used to enjoy eating fruits like berries and passion fruits which grew in forests. They would gather around rivers, lakes and swim which was a very interesting game in the sub-county.

People in this place used to protect rivers, lakes, swamps, mountains and they lived a happy life.

In Makindye sub-county, there are many different people of different tribes and clans. They speak different languages. A tribe is a group of people who live together and speak the same language. A clan is a group of people who are related. In Makindye sub-county, the largest tribe is the Baganda. Other tribes include; the Banyankole, Bagisu, Acholi, Iteso, Alur, Basoga, Banyoro. These people have different cultures. Culture includes language, music, dance, dressing, food and beliefs. Different tribes have different cultures. But the main language spoken in Makindye sub-county is Luganda. It is widely spoken in markets and in the neighbourhood. Even young children who are not Baganda, grow up speaking Luganda better than their languages.

In Makindye Sub-county, people practice different customs related to different things such as marriages, funerals, naming ceremonies, birthday parties and twin ceremonies. People from one tribe may marry from another tribe.

People in Makindye Sub-county are very hard working. They practice farming and also keep animals like cows, goats, pigs, sheep and birds like the chicken. They also carry out dairy farming and have many cows. The neighbouring sub-counties get milk from dairy farms of Makindye. People in Makindye are very happy. There is also, a very big lake, where they go fishing. Fishing is a very good business. They eat some fish and sell some to get money.

Near the lake there is a very big and beautiful hotel called Munyonyo Speke Resort. Tourists visit the hotel and bring in foreign money to our sub-county. The hotel provides employment to people around.

Many people work in Munyonyo Speke Resort.





Some of the crops people grow are; maize, bananas, sweet potatoes, rice, cassava, millet, sorghum, cotton, coffee, sugar canes, yams, beans.

Some plants grow in water and wetlands. Water lilies and water hyacinth grow on water. These plants are light so they can float on water. The papyrus and other tall grasses are also common in wetlands.

However, there are some crops which grow in dry places. Deserts and rocky places are some of the dry places. Some of these plants have small leaves and others thick leaves. These leaves store water for the plant. Such plants usually have thorns on the leaves for example the cactus plant and sisal plants. The thorns help them not to lose water.

Remember most plants grow well in loam soil. Some plants grow well in sand soil. Other plants grow well in clay soil. Swamps usually have plenty of clay. Areas near the swamps also have a lot of clay. Crops like yams, sugar canes and rice grow well in these areas. Plants are usually good to both people and animals. They provide food, shelter, firewood, fruits, medicine, timber and flowers for decoration.

Sometimes, we sell some of these plants and we get money. Toma was happy. She had learnt a lot about plants.

CIRCUMCISION

Circumcision in Bugishu culture is always colourful. It is for only boys between the ages of fourteen and eighteen. It is done during the even years only. At the beginning of January of every even year. All the people gather around in an open place to open the year for circumcision. You hear the sound of the horns going, "tululululuuuu...tulululuuuu... and the drumming of drums ... Bubuu bu bubuu bu... Palalalaaaaaa. Hmm...hmmm..."

Women and men, girls and boys, young and old go around dancing, shaking their shoulders, jumping up and down. Men who have already braved the knife hold sticks and branches of leaves. Girls and women and the boys to be circumcised are smeared with yeast and millet flour. The boys to be circumcised wear only shorts and animal skin at the back. The head gear called "Lirubisi" is worn on their heads and beads across the chests. They dance around with the knife for circumcision.

Men keep telling these boys who are going to be circumcised hot and encouraging words for the boys to be firm and courageous. They tell them words like, "Circumcision is not easy, it's like fire, It's like heaven falling on you, so you have to be brave. It is not a joke" All these words give confidence to the boys. The boy is not supposed to blink when being circumcised.

The cultural festive is from father to son. No boy can dodge it. They grow up knowing that one day they will be circumcised. It is passed on from generation to generation. It is a ceremony all Bagishu people enjoy.

That is circumcision in Bugishu land!
